



THE NEW AMERICAN BACKYARD

If Dublin is “The New American Backyard,” everyone’s invited to the party.

From a population of 14,350 in 1982, the year the city was incorporated, Dublin has grown to have a population of 60,159. As one of the fastest-growing cities in California, Dublin is ensuring diversity is not only accepted but celebrated.

For example, in August 2019, for the first time, the Dublin City Council proclaimed “Muslim Awareness and Appreciation Month,” which it hopes to continue next year. And in June, the Council unanimously voted to fly the LGBTQ Rainbow Flag at the Civic Center for Gay Pride Month after an overwhelming majority of citizens favored doing so.

Dublin’s embracing of diversity goes back to the town’s 1835 beginning, when José María Amador started a settlement at Alamilla Springs, a welcoming watering hole and resting point for all travelers.

Fifteen years later, Irish settlers bought land from Amador and founded a town, though exactly how Dublin acquired its name is something of a mystery. Some say the town's two

hotels — Dougherty Station and Amador Inn — were referred to by stagecoach drivers as the Double Inn, which became Dublin over time. Others say that because of the town's early Irish influence, the name Dublin reflects that lineage, and it's notable that neighboring San Ramon was once known as Limerick.

Much of the town’s early history can be found at the Dublin Heritage Park and Museums, where tombstone inscriptions and historical signs in the Pioneer Cemetery tell the story of those who peopled the valley when it was still considered the Wild West.

Yet Dublin is also a town that steps confidently into the future.

This May saw the opening of the new Kaiser Medical Offices and Cancer Center in Dublin. The 226,000-square-foot multi-specialty hub includes the Dublin Medical Office, surgery center, urgent care, and Cancer Center that features a

TrueBeam linear accelerator used in radiotherapy to precisely target a tumor while sparing surrounding normal tissue. And throughout the summer, Carl Zeiss Meditec (Dublin’s 4th top employer) made strides in constructing its U.S. headquarters for the Zeiss Medical Technology group, the company’s Industrial Quality & Research branch, and its Semiconductor Manufacturing Technology division.

Dublin’s combination of welcoming friendliness and cutting-edge business environment make it an alluring location to put down roots and raise a family. Branded in 2014 as The New American Backyard, Dublin provides top-notch schools, vibrant recreation, and beautiful parks.

Similarly, single and young adults favor the ultra-hip, mixed-used housing and commercial complexes, and professionals appreciate the diverse employment market.

For visitors, there are plenty of opportunities to sight see, dine, shop, enjoy entertainment, visit Livermore’s world-class wine country, tour San Francisco, and explore Northern California attractions like Yosemite and Lake Tahoe.

To navigate life in such a dynamic city, Dublin has created a New Resident Guide, with sections like Settle In, Find Your Way, Stay Informed, and A Dozen Things To Do In Your First Year. It joins Dublin's other informational outlets, including The Guide - To Fun in Our New American Backyard (an activity guide published quarterly), the City Report (newsletter), and Newsflash (email updates), whereas The Independent offers a free weekly newspaper that covers Dublin, Pleasanton and Livermore politics, schools, recreation, sports, arts and entertainment.

While appreciating the honor of being named an “All-American City” in 2011, Dublin continues to redefine what that means. The New American Backyard eschews the outdated, one-size-fits-all mindset, and instead embraces the excitement and growth that diversity brings.

Not quite 100 years after the California Gold Rush, when prospectors traveled across the Livermore Amador Valley on their way to the Sierra Nevada, an historical event once again drew people by the hundreds of thousands to the valley.

In 1942, the Navy began to build hundreds of buildings on 5.2 square miles of sprawling land between Dublin and Livermore. They would become Camp Parks, Camp Shoemaker and U.S. Naval Hospital Shoemaker — collectively known as Fleet City. Stretching over what is now Emerald Glen Park, Fleet City became a home away from home for Navy sailors, Marines, WAVES (Women Accepted for Voluntary Emergency Service) and Navy Seabees — members of the United States Navy Construction Battalions (CBs or "Seabees"), whose work included building bases, paving roadways, and constructing airstrips in WWII's Pacific theater.

Camp Parks was first established as a military base in World War II. Unofficially, the area was known as Fleet City, and included: Camp Parks (1942-46), a training and deployment center for the U. S. Navy's Construction Battalions (CB's or "Seabees"); Camp Shoemaker (1943-46), a Navy personnel distribution and separation center; and Shoemaker Naval Hospital (1943-46).

"When I tell people about the history of Dublin, they're surprised to find out that several hundred thousand sailors lived, worked, trained, and passed through what is now Dublin," says Steve Minniear, president of the Dublin Historical Preservation Association. "There were more theaters, large swimming pools, and people living here in 1944 than there are now."

To the east of Camp Parks was Camp Shoemaker, a Navy personnel distribution and separation center, and Shoemaker Naval Hospital.

"Sometimes I tell people that when they're at Emerald Glen Park, they're walking the same ground where thousands of patients recovered from injuries and illnesses during World War II," says Minniear.


Following WWII, the Navy sold some of its holdings, and leased land to Alameda County for use as Santa Rita Jail.

"Hundreds of two-story barracks and thousands of Quonset huts were auctioned off, with some of the lumber going to build houses in Livermore and Pleasanton," says Minniear, adding that at least two chapels were rebuilt in neighboring towns.

Camp Parks sat unused until the Cold War ramped up, prompting the U.S. Air Force to establish it in 1951 as a basic training center, renaming it Parks Air Force Base. In 1959, the installation was transferred once again to the U.S. Army where, until 1973, it was under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Sixth Army, Presidio of San Francisco. After 1973, the Army determined that Camp Parks was needed as a mobilization and training center for reserve components in the event of war or natural disaster. It was officially designated a semi-active installation, renaming it what it is still known as today: Parks Reserve Forces Training Area.

In 2017, the City of Dublin and the Army partnered to create the Dublin Camp Parks Military History Center, a museum that provides permanent, virtual and temporary exhibitions of historic artifacts related to Camp Parks' military past. It is located inside the new Visitor Control Center off Dougherty Road, just outside the military base's main gate. It is open daily from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

"The fact that every one of the major military services once operated bases here in Dublin, and that they are still here, is not widely known," says Minniear. "So as you think about Camp Parks today, think of it as the Navy base without a beach, the Air Force base without a paved runway, the Army base named after a Navy admiral, and an important part of Dublin's history and life."




DUBLIN HERITAGE PARK & MUSEUMS

Located a stone's throw away from the valley's very first settlement, the Dublin Heritage Park & Museums features two museums: the 1856 Murray Schoolhouse with a permanent Dublin-history exhibit, and the 1911 Kolb House with original-period furnishings that include the family's personal items and photographs.

The ten-acre site also contains the Old St. Raymond Church and the Pioneer Cemetery. During construction of the church in 1859, Tom Donlon fell to his death and became the first person to be buried in the cemetery. Today, giant oak and walnut trees shade the peaceful cemetery, while historical signs and tombstone inscriptions tell the story of the men, women and children who settled the valley.

The Heritage Park & Museums provide a nostalgic backdrop for various community events, including the Harvest Fair and the Ghosts of Dublin. In addition, the Dublin Heritage Park & Museums regularly host seasonal events, traditional music jams, and Hands-on History days (in 2019: Sept. 7, Oct. 5, Nov. 2, and Dec. 7). Admission to the museums is free during regular hours: 1 to 4 p.m. on Wednesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays, and 7 to 9 p.m. on Tuesdays.

DUBLIN CAMP PARKS MILITARY HISTORY CENTER

Opened in 2017, the Dublin Camp Parks Military History Center is located at the Camp Parks Visitor Center, outside the Main Gate on Dougherty Road.

The Dublin Camp Parks Military History Center houses the Camp Parks historical collection, with permanent

museum-quality exhibits and rotating temporary exhibits, and educational and research materials, along with hosting history activities several times a year.

A partnership between the City of Dublin and the Parks Reserve Forces Training Area created the center to preserve and share the fascinating stories of the military base that helped transform Dublin from a rural crossroads to the thriving city it is today.

Dublin Camp Parks Military History Center is free and open daily, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., for self-guided tours.


THE WAVE

Opened in 2017 in Emerald Glen Park, The Wave aquatic center is a 31,000-square foot, state-of-the-art facility anchored by an indoor pool, outdoor sports pool, waterslide tower, and splash zone with water-play features.

The indoor pool is open year-round for swim school, lap swimming, and water-exercise programs. The outdoor water park includes a sports pool, a tower with six waterslides on a tower, and a children's Splash Zone featuring a 500-gallon tipping bucket, shallow water-play pool, interactive sprays, and a climbable play structure.

The Wave offers space – including lawns and picnic areas – to spread out for a day of fun in the sun. The Community Room, an auditorium able to seat 216 people, features digital connection, a 70-inch monitor, and an integrated sound system – making it ideal for a variety of meetings and special events.

VALLEY CHILDREN'S MUSEUM

Historical California comes to life through exhibits, crafts and hands-on activities. The Valley Children's Museum is currently housed in an inviting 52-foot mobile structure in Emerald Glen Park; plans for a permanent building are in the works.

The museum is open year-round on the second Saturday of each month from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. In summer months, the museum is also open on Thursdays during the Dublin Farmers' Market.

Visitors are invited to make kites, covered wagons, Ohlone headbands, and clothespin dolls – similar to those enjoyed by Native American and pioneer children, as well as seasonal crafts like cloudburst mobiles in January and bug Valentines in February.

Additionally, the museum provides a program for 4th-grade classes called the Mission Experience, and is available to host children's birthday parties.

THE WAVE AQUATIC CENTER

ARLEN NESS SHOWROOM AND MUSEUM

Arlen Ness, a pioneer in the custom-motorcycle business, began building bikes out of his San Leandro garage more than 30 years ago.

Today, Ness's world headquarters and showroom, 6050 Dublin Boulevard, feature a museum with more than 40 vintage bikes. The collection includes the Untouchable, the Ness-Tique, the Blower Bike, the twin-motor Two Bad, the sports car-inspired Ferrari Bike, the '57 Chevy-inspired Ness-Stalgia, the Bugatti-like Smooth-Ness, the jet-powered Mach Ness, and the Discovery Channel's Biker Build Off winner Top Banana.

Arlen Ness Motorcycles is open Monday through Saturday, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. (5 p.m. on Saturdays).

EMERALD GLEN PARK

To the west, there's the ocean with miles of rugged coastline interrupted by sweeping beaches. To the east, there's the Sierras with crystal clear lakes shimmering in rocky canyons, and craggy snow-topped peaks featuring world-class ski resorts. Here, in Livermore-Amador Valley, is everything else: sports parks, playgrounds, hiking trails, and bicycle paths. One needn't venture far to enjoy recreation at its best.

PARKS

Emerald Glen Park provides the venue for numerous community events, including the Dublin Farmers' Market, outdoor summer movies, family campouts, and Splatter – a food, wine, music and art festival.

The Wave, a state-of-the-art swimming facility and entertainment complex, anchored by an indoor pool for swimming lessons, exercise programs, and recreational use, is a popular year-round site. Outdoors is the waterpark, featuring a sports pool for competitive swimming and water polo; a slide tower with two speed slides, three loop slides, and a large super bowl slide; and a splash pool for the young ones, featuring a beach entry with a large play

structure and a splash pad with fun spray features. The Wave Waterpark is open during the summer months.

The almost 50-acre Emerald Glen Park offers a water-play area, bocce courts, a lighted skateboard park, tennis and basketball courts, and baseball, softball, soccer and cricket fields.

Additional sports fields can be found at Dublin Sports Grounds, Fallon Sports Park and Ted Fairfield Park.

Neighborhood parks, offering picnic and play areas, are located throughout Dublin. Most-recently opened are Jordan Ranch Park and Sean Diamond Park.

Parks scheduled for completion in 2020 are Clover Park at Irongate, Don Biddle Community Park, Sunrise Park, and the new all-abilities playground at Dublin Sports Grounds.

OPEN SPACE PARKS

For hikers, bicyclists and equestrians, Dublin's open hills and wild canyons provide a scenic, rejuvenating environment to enjoy outdoor pursuits.

The Dublin Hills Regional Park, part of the East Bay Regional Park District, spans 654 acres of undeveloped land that offers breathtaking views of the Livermore-Amador Valley to the east, and the San Francisco skyline and Golden Gate Bridge to the west.

Its trails, including Calaveras Ridge, lead to grassland areas largely untouched since the 1800s. Hikers may sight red-tailed hawks, great-horned owls, deer and coyote, with ponds and wetlands apt to reveal newts, salamanders and California red-legged frogs.

Dougherty Hills Open Space is the city's largest with 107 acres. From its trailhead in the center of town, the park stretches along the top of the ridge, and offers sweeping views of the Livermore Amador Valley and Mount Diablo.

In all directions, open-space parks are a short drive away: Livermore's Del Valle Regional Park and Brushy Peak; Pleasanton's Sunol Regional Wilderness and Pleasanton Ridge Park; San Ramon's Las Trampas Regional Park; and Danville's Mount Diablo State Park.

TRAILS

The Martin Canyon Creek Trail is one of Dublin's hidden treasures. The trail, shaded by leafy trees, follows the creek for a mile before connecting to the Dublin Hills Regional Park. Located on the west side of town, its trailhead is on the corner of Silvergate and Bay Laurel Drives.

The Iron Horse Trail is a paved, multi-use trail that stretches 26 miles, from Concord to Pleasanton. It follows the Southern Pacific Railroad right-of-way that was established in 1891 and abandoned in 1977. The wide, relatively-flat Dublin segment predominantly runs alongside Coyote Creek.

The Alamo Canal Trail, less than one mile long, connects the Iron Horse Trail near the Dublin Library with Pleasanton's Centennial Trail which runs alongside the South San Ramon Creek.

DOG PARKS

Two parks are designated for dogs to be off leash: the Dougherty Hills Dog Park, with areas for large and small dogs; and Bray Commons (Bray, Ireland, is Dublin's sister city) for small dogs only.

ICE SKATING

It makes no difference whether there are rainstorms or heat waves, good times are always around the corner at Rockin' Jump Trampoline Park.

The facility's main floor is covered with wall-to-wall trampolines, but bouncing is not just for fun; visitors of all ages are encouraged to jump for fitness as well. Bouncers can enjoy anti-gravity activities such as cannon balling into the stunt-bag area, jousting with competitors on the gladiator-style X-Beam, or pulling down rebounds off the Rockin' Dunk backboard. Cageball, dodgeball, and basketball are also available, along with a climbing wall.

Adding to the fun are a Rockin' Tots program, teen and family nights, and birthday party packages.

BOWLING

Earl Anthony's Dublin Bowl offers a state-of-the-art facility with 40 lanes, a snack bar, sports lounge, and video arcade. Considered by many to be the greatest bowler of all time, Earl Anthony won countless championships before retiring. In 1980, he purchased the Dublin bowling alley and arranged to have ESPN cover an annual tournament from 1984 to 1992.

Today the alley features league play for juniors, seniors and adults, and offers fun events like Manic Mondays, Kids' After School Special, and Friday Night Frenzy with pop music, swirling lights and unlimited bowling.

Celebrate [sel-uh-breyt], verb: To rejoice in or host special festivities to mark a happy day or event; to participate in a party or an uninhibited good time. Have no doubt, Dubliners love to celebrate. Better still, they love sharing celebrations with everyone — neighbors and visitors, family and friends.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY CELEBRATION

Naturally, the City of Dublin goes all out for St. Patrick's Day, welcoming visitors from all over the world to one of the largest celebrations on the West Coast, drawing some 80,000 attendees.

In 2020, the fun begins on Friday, March 13, and goes through Sunday, March 15.

The Green & White Gala kicks off the holiday weekend Friday night, followed by the Alameda County Firefighters Annual Breakfast with green pancakes on Saturday morning.

By 9:30 a.m., crowds of revelers line the streets for the Dublin Lions Club Parade featuring bagpipes, floats, marching bands, and equestrian groups.

The festival runs both weekend days from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and includes Irish-themed food and drink (Corned Beef Sliders, Irish Bangers and Mash, and Guinness-marinated Tri-Tip on Irish Soda Bread); more than 250 arts and craft booths (Celtic artwork and handmade jewelry, Irish tartans, and hand-knit wool sweaters); three stages showcasing entertainment (traditional Irish folk music, Celtic Rock, and dance performances); a pop-up Irish tea cottage; and plenty of carnival rides.

On Sunday morning, the Shamrock 5K Fun Run begins at 8:30 a.m. It is open to runners and walkers of all skill levels, and is followed by a second day of festivities.

A free shuttle runs from BART to the celebration.


SPRING EGGSTRAVAGANZA

SPLATTER

It's not your ordinary wine, food, music, and art festival.

Since 2012, Dublin has marked the end of summer with a colorful burst of food, wine, art and music called Splatter. The 9th annual festival will take place in early- to mid-September 2020 at Emerald Glen Park. Splatter is known for its family-friendly art activities, interactive demonstrations, live music and dance performances, and cooking demonstrations and culinary marketplace.

The fun begins at noon and concludes with an evening dance-party concert at 7 p.m. The event typically includes Tasting Gardens (shaded outdoor seating areas surrounded by restaurant, winery and craft-brewery booths), Backseat Theatre with guests climbing into the backseat of a car to experience a mini-play by two actors in the front seat, and color run-style games with participants starting out in white shirts and ending up wearing a rainbow of colors. Attendees may enjoy live music and dance performances, roaming entertainers, interactive demonstrations, carnival rides, shopping at the arts and crafts marketplace, and taking selfies in inventive ensembles at Splatshot.

Admission to the festival is free, however there are costs for children's carnival rides and games, and certain activities.

HARVEST FAIR

Old-fashioned fall fun takes place in October amid rustic barns, historic buildings and a pioneer cemetery at the Dublin Heritage Park & Museums, 6600 Donlon Way.

Admission to the fair is free, with visitors able to take a tractor-pulled wagon-ride, play in a hay stack, and stroll through the scarecrow exhibit. The 1910 Kolb House and 1850s Murray Schoolhouse will be open during the event for tours.

A \$7 activity pass allows children to participate in hands-on historical activities, like churning butter, panning for gold, "calf roping," using a washboard, and creating corn husk dolls. Fall foods, including caramel apples, pie, hot apple cider and popcorn, will be available for purchase.

GHOSTS OF DUBLIN

Flashlight tours at the Dublin Heritage Park & Museums leave every half hour for walks through the Dublin Pioneer Cemetery, in which graves date back to the 1850s. Registrants hear haunting tales of local settlers and ghosts, see eerie images of long-dead pioneers in Old St. Raymond Church, and peek inside the parlor of the Kolb House – while sipping hot cider and eating popcorn.

HOLIDAY CHEER

Dublin invites all to celebrate the season of magic and goodwill at these holiday events: the 36th Annual Holiday Tree Lighting Ceremony takes place at 7 p.m., on Thursday, Dec. 5, 2019, at the Civic Center with Saint Nick, caroling, cookies and hot cocoa; Breakfast with Santa takes place at the Shannon Community Center with three seatings and a chance to take photos with Santa; and Hands-On History Day at the Heritage Park and Museums offers families the opportunity to create old-fashioned holiday decorations and lifelong memories. Residents can also participate in a "Deck the Homes" holiday decorating contest, with categories in best use of lights, best lawn display, best holiday theme, and best overall.

From kindergartners to adults, Dublin students thrive with the support of the Dublin Unified School District, City of Dublin, Dublin Partners in Education and an academically-minded community.

Superintendent Dave Marken, Ed. D., says, "As the 2018-19 school year ended, we reached a two-year agreement with our certificated staff and passed a renewed parcel tax. That positive momentum carried over into the summer with Board approval of the final site plan concept and educational program for our future high school, the election of a new trustee member, groundbreaking for the Dublin High School Engineering and Science Building, renovations of the DHS track and field, new HVAC units at Dublin Elementary, and continued progress on modernization projects at Frederiksen and Murray Elementary Schools."

The Dublin Unified School District's vision is for all students to become lifelong learners. Its mission is to provide a rigorous and relevant 21st-century education that prepares each student for college, career or service to the country.

The district is composed of nearly 10,000 students in 12 schools: seven elementary schools, one K-8, two middle schools, and two high schools (one comprehensive, one alternative).

In 2018, Dublin High School celebrated its 50th anniversary. A California Distinguished School honoree, DHS has won several national academic awards, was included in Newsweek's List of America's Top Public High Schools, and was awarded a Silver Medal in the U.S. News and World Report ranking of high schools. Perhaps even more telling of DHS's success is the fact that more than 95% of its students report attending a 2- or 4-year college.

Dublin Partners in Education (DPIE) has been supporting the entire school system since 1992. The non-profit organization fosters business, community and education partnerships for the benefit of Dublin students, through programs geared toward creativity, technical skills, and career preparedness and exploration, as well as offering after-school and summer programs promoting STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math) courses.

Dublin Unified Adult Education offers a variety of programs for adults, including a wide range of English as a Second Language (ESL) classes and a Bridge to Careers and College course designed to help students transition to college and the business world.

Las Positas College is located in Livermore, a ten-minute drive away. Along with cutting-edge classrooms and laboratories, the campus features unique facilities and programs, such as horticulture and viticulture programs, a Veterans First program, an environmental hazardous materials program, a self-paced electronics program, and a theater with an outstanding drama department. Student success is fostered through programs and services designed for the development of the whole student, while computers, CD-ROM, sound-proof rooms, and group study rooms allow students to do in-depth research, practice musical instruments, and collaborate on complex projects.

Several excellent universities are located within a short drive of Dublin, including California State University East Bay in Hayward. Dublin provides convenient commuting through two Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) stations.

Located in the heart of downtown, the vibrant Dublin Senior Center offers the 50+ set a wide range of social, educational and recreational programs designed to excite the mind, body and spirit.

For the mind, activities include a reading club, creative writing groups, American Sign Language lessons, and computer classes with on-site computers available for public use on a first-come, first-served basis.

For the body, diverse activity choices encompass every interest and physical-fitness level: Seniorobics, Tai Chi Chuan Practice, Gentle Yoga, Chair Pilates, Strong by Zumba, Jazzercise, and Balance, Agility & Strength. Those who like to move to music may join ballroom and line dancing classes.

Taking activities outdoors, the Path Wanderers and the Tri-Valley Trekkers explore nature's beauty, get fresh air and make new friends, while enjoying walks tailored to their specific abilities or moods.

For the spirit, the senior center offers plenty of ways to play: with games like bingo, bridge, mah-jong, and ping pong; with creative arts like acrylics, watercolors, origami, and Art for All Media; and with excursions to places like San Francisco, Sacramento, and Santa Cruz.

Adding to the fun are the City's many events and programs, including bocce tournaments, the St. Patrick's Day Festival, PicnicFlix Family Movie Nights, the Holiday Tree Lighting, and more. In November, the Senior Center celebrates local veterans and active-duty military with its Wall of Heroes display; and every December, seniors can swing to the sounds of Duke Ellington and Cole Porter at the Holiday DanceEscape.

TRANSPORTATION

Dublin, a hub that once served the Pony Express and later the Lincoln Highway, sits at the crossroads of Interstates 580 and 680. Venturing out in any direction leads to a host of natural, cultural and business destinations: San Francisco, Silicon Valley, Santa Cruz, Monterey, Livermore wine country, Yosemite, Lake Tahoe and Mendocino. Today, getting around Dublin's nearly 15 square miles, as well as venturing farther out, continues to be convenient.

WHEELS

WHEELS bus service provides public transportation in the Tri-Valley region — including Dublin, Livermore and Pleasanton — and links with Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) and Altamont Commuter Express (ACE) stations for connections to and from the greater Bay Area and Central Valley.

Founded in 1986, WHEELS makes 500 stops along 17 local routes, and 15 school routes. The Livermore Amador Valley Transit Authority provides safe, comfortable and affordable public transportation to popular destinations like Las Positas College, the Alameda County Fairgrounds, the Livermore labs, and shopping centers including Stoneridge mall, Hacienda Crossings, and the San Francisco Premium Outlets.

AIRPORTS

Livermore Airport: 3 miles. Called the Gateway to the Tri-Valley, the Livermore Municipal Airport (LVK) features special events like the Collings Foundation's Wings of Freedom Tour on Memorial Day weekend, and the annual Open House & Air Show in October.

Oakland International: 17 miles
San Jose International: 30 miles
San Francisco International: 36 miles

BAY AREA RAPID TRANSIT (BART)

This public, rapid-transit, elevated and subway system that connects Bay Area cities long five routes has two Dublin stations: the West Dublin/Pleasanton BART station straddles Interstate 580, with a south exit leading to Pleasanton's Stoneridge Mall, and a north exit to downtown Dublin; and the Dublin/Pleasanton station several miles to the east, with an island platform located on I-580's center median, and parking available on both sides of the freeway.

ALTAMONT CORRIDOR EXPRESS (ACE)

ACE is a commuter rail service linking Stockton to San Jose. The service, named for the Altamont Pass through which it passes, began in 1998.

Currently, ACE operates Monday through Friday (excluding major holidays), with four westbound trains in the morning, and four returning eastbound trains in the evening.




